Gandhi who was truly devoted to India and its culture attacked one of the pillars of the Hindu culture - the caste system. Mao Tse Tung, a devotee of Chinese culture, severely cricised Confucius without whom one cannot think of Chinese culture.

Cultural Revolution is not cultural rejection. Those who reject their culture can have neither the means nor the authority to change it. The greatdanger to all ethnic cultures stems from mass production, mass consumption and the mass media which is made possible by manipulative modern science and technology about which E.F. Schumacher writes.

Politics and economics come and go but culture is of fundamental importance. Culture is like religion, it is a deep source of renewal for the individual and the society. Like religion culture is not static, it is evolving with our continuous experience. Satish Kumar.
